# GE Area D: Social Sciences

Area D courses increase students' understanding of human behavior and social interaction in the context of value systems, economic structures, political institutions, social groups, and natural environments. Students develop an understanding of problems and issues from different disciplinary perspectives and examine issues in their contemporary as well as historical settings and in a variety of cultural contexts.

The CSU requires students to complete General Education courses in the Social Sciences in at least two different disciplines. Students may meet this requirement by either 1) taking two lower-division Area D courses in different disciplines, or 2) taking two lower-division Area D courses in the same discipline and an Area S upper-division GE course in a different discipline.

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This is a fully asynchronous course. That means that we do not meet as a class on any set time.

You will proceed through the course at your pace but MUST MEET THE SET DUE DATES for each homework assignment, paper assignment, poster assignment, and exam.

This is a full semester worth of learning in a condensed time frame, so please know there will be a substantial time commitment required to succeed in this course.

The assignments and the exam have all been set with a due date (deadline).

The exam MUST be taken on the posted date and completed by the end of that day (deadline). You will have 75 minutes to complete the exam.

I have set up a course structure for you to follow in order to meet the deadlines and not be overwhelmed by the workload in the course.

This structure is not strictly required, EXCEPT that you MUST MEET THE MODULE DEADLINES for the homework assignments, ppster assignment, paper assignment, and the exam.

How long will it take each week to stay up with the course?

Well, it is an asynchronous course, so you will ultimately decide this. I have calculated estimates of how much time you would likely spend each day working on the course material. Note that each day in our Summer course is often the same as a week of learning in a regular 16 week semester. The amount of time allotted per day amounts to about 5-6 hours for lecture review, assignments, reading, and studying, just like each week for a regular semester.

Some of you work, read, and just perform faster than others of us, so each of our allotted time will vary. There is a full day built into our schedule to complete and be certain all assignments are done for each Module. In reality, you should really complete each assignment on the suggested due date.

I am very happy to chat about time management, these estimates, and how to help you best succeed in this class.

## **LECTURE MATERIAL**

In each Module I have uploaded video lectures of me narrating the lecture slides as I would in an in-person class. These are likely the best way to try to learn the course material. I have uploaded the lecture slides for you to read on your own, but I think this would be a hard way to learn the material.

#### **DISCUSSION POST**

10 points: You will each complete a discussion post on a Conocimiento Activity. The instructions for this assignment will be in the Discussion Post. This assignment is due June 6.

## TOPHAT HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENT

130 points: For each chapter you will complete a homework assignment <u>within TopHat</u>. Each homework assignment will be due on the Friday of the week the reading is assigned. For example, Ch. 1 homework assignment will be due on June 6th.

I will drop the the 2 lowest scores.

Annotating textbook chapters contribute to **Program Learning Outcome 1** (Knowledge Base of Psychology), **Outcome 3** (Critical Thinking Skills), and **Outcome 4** (Applications of Psychology).

## PAPER ASSIGNMENT (Covering Ch. 1-9):

50 pts: Psychology in Real Life

Psychology is best understood in-context, and thus you will have the opportunity to apply course concepts to real-life psychological matters.

Your task for this project is to 1) describe a psychological theory or concept from <u>Ch. 1-9</u> in our textbook of interest to you and 2) write a short, in-depth response about how that theory/concept relates to your Self, a friend or family member, or life situations.

Entries should be 750 words, 1" margins size, 12pt times new roman font, and DOUBLE SPACED.

A rubric will be posted in Canvas with exact instructions and point breakdowns.

This assignment will be graded and returned to you 1 week after the due date. You will have the opportunity to redo the assignment and turn it in 1 week after receiving feedback. Please refer to the class schedule for due dates.

Assignment 1 contributes to **Program Learning Outcome 1** (Knowledge Base of Psychology) **Outcome 2** (Critical Thinking Skills) and **Outcome 4** (Applications of Psychology).

# **POSTER ASSIGNMENT:**

50 points: By yourself you will select a peer-reviewed psychological research article based on a topic discussed in lecture or in your textbook and create a poster based on the selected research article.

You will upload the poster to Canvas by the due date, July 3rd.

The posters may be completed using Google Slides, Powerpoint, or Canva.

I will post 2 lectures on how to find a peer-reviewed psychology research article and how to make a poster.

A rubric will be posted in Canvas with exact instructions and point breakdowns. The poster. should be **750** words.

This assignment contributes to Program Learning Outcome 2 (Research Methods in Psychology).

## **CUMULATIVE EXAM (100 Points)**

The cumulative exam will consist of 100 multiple-choice questions. The exam will cover lecture and textbook material and will be cumulative.

The exam is open-note, open-textbook, but not open internet or open friend.

Once you open the exam you will have 1 hour and 15 minutes to complete the exam.

The exam will become available in Canvas beginning July 3 at 5:00 am (PST) and close at the end of that day at 11:59 pm (PST).

Exam questions will cover any materials discussed in class lectures and anything from the reading. There will be material on the exam that we will not discuss in class; therefore, you should complete all assigned readings. Likewise, there will be material on the exam that is not in your textbook. Therefore, it is important that you watch lectures. The emphasis in this class will be on ideas, theories, and research more than on names, dates, and statistics.

The exam <u>MUST BE COMPLETED</u> on the date listed in the course syllabus and online. You can take it before the final time it is due, but the exam will be closed once the due date and time have passed. There is no makeup for the exam and it must be completed by July 3, 2025.

**WORKING ON YOUR OWN**: During the exam you cannot communicate with anyone during the test. Do not call, text, or communicate in any way with anyone else. I will evaluate the exam for evidence of cheating in response patterns and other indicators. Note that cheating will result in an F in the course, and report will be made the SJSU's office of Academic Integrity.

**TIMING**: You will have 75 minutes to complete the exam, unless other accommodations have been made. Once you start the exam, the 75 minutes begins. When that time limit expires, the exam will close. Again, the exam will be open at 5:00am (PST)and close at the end of that day at 11:59pm (PST).

**COMPUTER USE**: I strongly encourage you to use a laptop or desktop computer to take the exam, as mobile devices do not always interface with Canvas as effectively. Please try to be located where you have consistent access to the internet.

**BACKUP PLAN FOR TEST TAKING**: I encourage you to have some kind of backup plan in the event your internet goes out, your laptop battery gets low, or some other dreadful thing happens. I know this is challenging, but it is better to have that plan than to be in a situation when things go badly with no backup plan.

**QUESTIONS**: I will not be able to be available to you during the exam time, as people will be taking this at different times during the day. I am very happy to talk about your questions once the exam is completed and you have access to review your exam.
